Dr. Lucia D. Wocial, PhD, RN, FAAN.

Dr. Wocial has been a registered nurse since 1985. She practiced in neonatal intensive care for more than 20 years both as a staff nurse and a certified clinical nurse specialist. Her current clinical practice is ethics. She is currently the nurse ethicist and program leader in Nursing Ethics for the Fairbanks Center for Medical Ethics (FCME) at Indiana University Health in Indianapolis, Indiana. She is a faculty mentor for the clinical ethics fellowship at FCME. She co-chairs the ethics consultation service sub-committee and is an active member of the ethics consultation service at Indiana University Health in Indianapolis. Her current research focuses on moral distress of professional caregivers, with a particular interest on clinicians who practice in the in-patient setting. She is the project director for the Woltman Inter-professional Communication Project (WISP) with the Indiana University School of Nursing where she is an adjunct assistant professor.

David Orentlicher, MD, JD,

The Samuel R. Rosen Professor and co-director of the Hall Center for Law and Health at Indiana University Robert H. McKinney School of Law. He specializes in health law and constitutional law. He also teaches health law as an adjunct professor of medicine at Indiana University School of Medicine.

A graduate of Harvard Law School and Harvard Medical School, Dr. Orentlicher previously has taught as a visiting or adjunct professor at Princeton University, University of Chicago Law School, and Northwestern University Medical School. He also served as director of the American Medical Association's division of medical ethics for 6½ years.

While at the AMA, Dr. Orentlicher led the drafting of the association's first patients' bill of rights. He also drafted guidelines for physician investment in health care facilities that were incorporated into federal law and guidelines on gifts to physicians from industry that have become the industry standard and a standard recognized by the federal government. He helped develop many other positions—on end-of-life matters, organ transplantation, and reproductive issues—that have been cited by courts and government agencies in their decision-making.

Dr. Orentlicher is widely published in both the mass media and academic journals. He also is author of *Matters of Life and Death* (Princeton University Press) and co-author of *Health Care Law and Ethics* (now in its 8th edition). His most recent book, *Two Presidents Are Better Than One: The Case for a Bipartisan Executive* (NYU Press), draws on his experiences with partisan conflict as a member of the Indiana House of Representatives from 2002 to 2008.

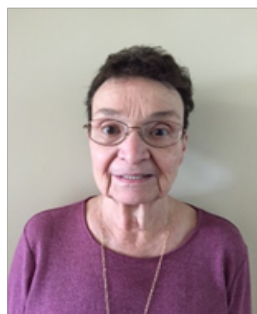

Danielle Patten, BSN, RN, Indiana University Health

Danielle Patten's a Registered Nurse supervisor for the OPTIMISTIC. OPTIMISTIC is an 8 year, \$30.3 million CMS funded demonstration project aimed at improving quality of care and reducing avoidable hospitalizations in Indiana nursing homes. In her role, she provides training and education, helping nursing home staff improve their geriatric skill sets and elevating the quality of care a facility can deliver. She also supervises a group of the OPTIMISTIC RN's. She is a Respecting Choices Last Steps ACP Certified Instructor and Facilitator. Danielle demonstrates the Last Steps ACP POLST Paradigm Program approach to advance care planning in her long-term care facility. She received an Outstanding Achievement Award from CMS in June 2015 for extraordinary effort and outstanding work in implementing the CMS Initiative to Reduce Avoidable Hospitalizations among Nursing Facility Residents using the OPTIMISTIC model.



Nancy Orme, RN, Northwest Healthcare

Nancy Orme is a Registered Nurse working as a staff development coordinator at Northwest Healthcare. In her role she provides education to CNAs, helping to improve care for the residents, seeing that State regulations are followed. Nancy also provides three (3) hours of dementia training annually for all staff. Nancy works with the Music and Memory program at her skilled nursing facility, which has been in effect since April 2015. She will be working with Butler University in a Music First program.
